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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The Karnataka Lingayant Education society was established in the year 1916 with the efforts of seven dedicated great teachers, now globally recognized iconic KLE Society, to provide basic education to the economically and educationally deprived knowledge seekers of the northern part of Karnataka. The KLE family reverentially worships these noble souls as the 'SAPTARSHIS' which means the 'Seven Sages'. The society has been playing a key role in the Academic and socio-economic upliftment of North Karnataka region. There are More than 16500 employees are serving and 1,22,500 students are pursing their studies. The true sprit of democry is practiced in the functioning of the Society. Further, in this era of LPG the society has geared upto set new global standards with a firm belief in "Adapt and Excel".

The college is affiliated to Rani Channamma University, Belagavi as a result of carving out of a new University from Karnataka University's Jurisdiction. Our college is regonised by UGC under section 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC 1956. In the year 2008, Our College was merged with KLE Society. Since then we are in the KLE family.

Our College has been imparting quality education to the rural youth in Arts, Commerce and Science streams. We are proud that from the academic year 2017-18 PG course in commerce has been introduced. In 2020-21 (Current year), a total of 1066 students are pursuing their education in various programmes mentioned above and are well supported by 38 teaching. Our college is following the Best Practices such as felicitation of meritorious students and constellation of rank holders. As result in 2013 our student Mr. Ramesh Harkangi got 3rd Rank in BA with gold medal in Kannada and Miss Deepa Sapsagar got 6th Rank during 2015 in B.com with Gold medal in Business Statistics from Rani Channamma University, Belagavi. Again our gem students Miss Gayatri Bagewadi secured 6th Rank and Miss Roopa Sutar 10th Rank during 2019 in BA from Rani Channamma University, Belagavi. The college has undergone assessment and accreditation by NAAC with B++ grade in 2017, B grade in 2011(Cycle 2nd) and 2005 (Cycle 1st).

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The College offers 04 programs; 3 UG Programs underB.A, B.Sc and B.Com. One PG programs, M.comintroduced in the academic year 2017-18, All the programmes are of semester system. We follow the University mandated curriculum. Effective implementation of the curriculum is ensured through the development and meticulous deployment of the action plans. The faculty of our College has made significant contributions in the curriculum design and development. Dr. B.M.Patil and Dr. A.M.Narode are the BoS & BOE member in the subject of Kannada of RCU, Belagavi. Shri S.M.Bannur, Shri M.M.Nimbaragi, Dr K.M.Awaradi & Dr M.G.Yarnal have been participating in setting question papers and all the eligible teachers in evaluation process in their respective subjects of the affiliating university. The Principal of our College Dr. B. M. Patil has edited Kannada Basic text books for B.Com I and II semesters. Dr. A. M. Narode has edited Kannada Basic text books for B.Sc, BBA, BCA I semester, B.Com I and II semesters and also BA III Semester. In our college CBCS system for M.Com course was implemented from academic year 2017-18, from academic year 2020-21 CBCS system was adopted for all the three UG programs. NEP was introduced for all the degree programs from the academic year 2021-22.

The average and advanced learners are admitted for Certificate courses. In order to integrate the cross cutting issues relevant to Environment and Sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics, the institution has

embeded different types of courses in the curriculum such as Indian Constitution, Bharathiya Samskruthi and Sharana Sahithya, Human Rights and Environmental Studies for all UG students. M.Com course includes experiential learning through project work. Cent percent of final year PG students have been undertaking project work since it is mandatory as per RCUB. With the encouragement of the college, various departments undertake 30 student's project works with the participation of 875 UG students. Student's feedback on teachers and curriculum are taken to make teaching-learning more effective. Majority of our decisions, both academic and non academic are primarily based on formal and informal feedback from students, parents, Alumni and staff.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The number of students seeking admission to our college is increasing year by year. Enrollment increased from 728 to 1066 during the period from 2016-17 to 2021-22. The growth in student enrollment justifies the academic performance and development of college. The admission process is regulated by Rules of the State Government and affiliating university. Advanced and slow learners are identified through their performance in class tests and interaction in classes. For advance learners extra books, cash prizes & scholarship facilities are provided. Special classes for slow learners are conducted and slow learners are offered periodic tests to ensure that they perform well. To avoid irregular students becoming slow learners, mentors take special care of such wards by contacting parents, sending sms to bring to their notice the performance of their wards. Highlights of student centric methods adopted in our college are provision for individual involvement in practical / project work, field visit, industrial visits, case studies, debates, seminars, presentations, educational tours and special lecture programmes. A well equipped computer lab with 36 computer systems which have internet connectivity and Tally software. 17 Classrooms with LCD projectors screens. Language lab has 'Hi-Class' Software and audio-visual system. Students are motivated to prepare class seminars and make presentations to improve their presentation skills by using LCD projectors. The college has total 41 faculty members of whom 9 are aided and 32 are appointed by management. Out of 41 faculty members 11 are Doctrates, 4 are M.Phil, 2 NET qualified and 7 are SLET qualified. Two of our gem students Miss Gayatri Bagewadi secured 6th Rank and Miss Roopa Sutar 10th Rank during 2019 in BA from Rani Channamma University, Belagavi. The students' performance in examinations has consistently improved from year to year during the assessment period. There are 73 Centum scorers of whom 67 in Commerce and 06 in Science stream in different subjects during this period.

The IQAC has devised and implemented an evaluation mechanism for the achievement of programme outcomes for last few years to ascertain the quality of teaching and learning process.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Full time teachers in the college are 41. Two of our faculty members are Research Guides in the subject of Kannada of RCU Belagavi and Kannada University Hampi. 11 research scholars have been awarded Ph.d Degrees under the supervision of college research guides. The Institution has spent Rs. 35,210 towards Students Research Projects during this cycle. Our institution has organized 19 quality initiative programs in collaboration with many associations, publications, industries and bodies during the current accreditation cycle. During this period 23 Research Papers in Journals notified in UGC care list and 47 Books, Chapters and Papers in volumes with ISBN/ISSN have been published by our faculty members. NSS/YRC units of our college are at the forefront of various extension activities which include Blood donation, Tree plantation, Health awareness,

Water conservation, Campiagn against plastic waste, Cleaniness campaigns, Voters awareness programs and women's empowerment through Legal awareness. Together theses initiatives help to create a bond between instituition and local community. The Institution conducted 33 Extension and Outreach Programs through NSS/YRC and various Departments with the participation of 2628 students during this cycle. Our institution has organized every year Health check up and Blood Donation Camp. More than 813 students of our college donated blood in these camps. On 28th December 2021 our college Youth Red Ribbon Club was awarded as a best Red Ribbon Club by Karnataka state government Health and family welfare department of Bagalkot district. NSS/YRC and Alumni Association of our college organized Jatha in Mahalingpur town, collected and distributed funds worth of Rs.1,48,193 to Kodagu District Flood Affected People on 24-08-2018. To mitigate woes of flood victims our college NSS/ YRC and Alumni Association organized Flood Relief Programme and Swachata activity in flood affected Dhavaleswar Village and distributed essential materials worth Rs.50,000 collected from staff & student on 17-08-2019. Faculties of different streams have 12 MoU and 22 collaborations with colleges, Universities, NGO, Industries and Research Institutions.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college authority has created sufficient infrastructure necessary to facilitate effective teaching and learning processes. The policy of the college is to enhance the existing infrastructure and add new amenities to its existing infrastructure by procuring the necessary equipments needed by all the labs. Our College has well ventilated 17 classrooms which can accommodate all the students admitted to different streams of education. All the class room of at least 480 square feet of floor space each. All the classrooms are fitted with CCTV cameras. Our College developed four Science Labs during this cycle. We have a well equipped Auditorium with 200 seating capacity. Our College has its own well developed play field with 6 lane 200 mtrs. Track, Volley Ball court, Kabaddi court, and tenny-coit court, a state of art indoor stadium for games like badminton, Table Tennis and Chess, Fitness centre has 16 stations Multi Gym. The construction of multi-purpose Gymnasium completed at the cost of Rs.1.57 crores for which management contributed Rs.57 lakhs. College library has a vast collection of books and research journals. Total No. of Text books at present available in the library is 16,893 worth Rs.21,36,544. We have 11,197 reference books value of Rs.19,15,1345. College library subscribes to 43 journals spending on an average Rs.36,795 annually. A well equipped computer lab with 46 systems and 2 photocopiers is available for the investigators to carry out research work diligently. Band width internet connection enhanced to 60 MBPS. Paid annual subscription of Rs.5900 to INFLIBNET. The construction of Gymnasium, two ladies hostels, separate rest room for lady staff, furniture, lights and fans, CCTV coverage, IT friendly campus, administrative rooms, e-library and the office backed up by inverters, Purified drinking water facility are made available for the smooth functioning. New rest-rooms for Girls and Boy students have been constructed. Botanical Garden and herbal gardens have been developed with several herbal, medicinal and devotional plants in the College campus. The expenditure incurred by our institution on maintenance of physical and academic infrastructure increased from Rs. 48.49 lakhs to 107.79 lakhs during this period.

Student Support and Progression

The college supports students to avail scholarships, freeships and concessions from Government and non-gonvernement entities. Since 2017, an average 58% of the students have availed scholarships and freeship from Government. During this cycle college organized 75 capacity building and skill enhancement programs such as Soft Skills (42), Language and communication skills (11), Life skills (17) and ICT/computing skills (06). College has the goal to benefit each and every student by these kinds of initiatives. 2684 students benefited by

guidance for competitive examination and career counseling in this period of accreidiation. The college conducted zonal and inter zonal tournaments 4 times in various events. Special incentives in the form of Blazers & financial assistance are provided by the College to the participants. It is matter of pride to say that our volley ball team became champion in Zonal and Inter-zonal competitions in the year 2017-18, 2018-19 and 2019-20 respectively. Our proud mens volley ball team achieved championship in Zonal and inter-zonal level competitions during the year 2019-20. The college has produced 26 university Blues during this cycle. Cultural Department of college organized RCUB Youth Festival (UG Zonal) during the year 2017-18 and in 2018-19 PG University Level youth festival, our college emerged as General Champion in both the cultural competitions. On 9th December, 2021 a Gem of our student Geeta Kolkar was felicitated with Honarary Doctarate in Hindustani Music by Indian Empire University, at Pondicheery. Our college has distinctive practices regarding the Registered Alumni Association. Alumni sponsor cash prizes for students seminars, workshops and conferences organized in the college. Alumni also offer financial assistance to poor & meritorious students. Total financial support by Alumni is Rs.6,81,150 during this period. Our top alumni occupied the position of Judges (3), Chartarted Accountant and PSI 4 each.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Top management of our institution consisting of Board of Management and Local Governing Body provide effective leadership in every possible way to achieve vision and mission of our college. Decentralization of authority and responsibility is practiced to follow the concept of participative management in the institution's governance. The College follows the principle of participatory management during the stages of policy formulation and its implementation. The College administration solicits and encourages the participation of HOD's of different departments and Co-ordinators of various committees as well as student representatives in major decision making process. The staff members take active participation in the functioning of different committees. Our college implements e-governance in the areas of Administration, Finance and Accounts, Student's admission, support and examinations. College has offers various welfare schemes for Teaching and non-teaching staff. Our institution provides financial support to aided as well as unaided staff to attend conferences /workshops/FDP/training. We have organized five Professional development/Administrative programs for teaching and non-teaching staff till the date. 17 of our teachers have undergone online faculty development programs during Covid-19 Pandemic period. Institute conducts internal and external financial audit regularly by the CA appointed by KLE Society, Belagavi. Financial audit is also periodically conducted by the accounts section of our Joint Director's office and also by Accountnt general of the state government. Academic audit is carried out by University LIC. The reports are available in the college. The teachers are using ICT resources for online teaching/meeting platforms and organized Online Training Programs, National Level Webinars and Special Programs. Online paper presentations are made by faculty members in Webinars organized by other colleges. The college follows performance based appraisal system of UGC as prescribed in the regulations. From the academic year 2017-18 PG Course in Commerce has been introduced. Our college organized 68 State/National/International level conferences/Seminars/workshop/webinars on quality in this cycle. IQAC conducted 20 meetings and submitted four AQARs (30-05-2021). 483 different programs and other special activities were conducted under IQAC banner.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Instituitional values and best practices are clearly reflected in various activities and programs of the college like, gender equity promotion, women respect and safety, good behavior, prevention of sexual harassment at work place. CCTV surveillance facility has been installed in the entire campus. Security guard have been

appointed for ensuring security and safety. For gender equity Ladies room, Sanitary napkin vending machine, Hostel facilties for girl students and health care facilities are provided. A medical officer is appointed to care of health of the students. Solar photo voltaic panels are installed in the campus to harness alternative energy. They help to reduce electricity consumption. Solar street lights are used on the campus to illuminate the campus free of cost. Solar water heaters are used in the ladies hostel. The College has landscaped gardens and the coconut trees are around the building. Herbal garden has been developed with several herbal and medicinal plants. The College now is proud of an enviable lush green lawn to enhance the beauty of the campus and visual experience of students. And sufficient water resources are available on the campus for watering the garden, vegetation and for drinking purpose. The College has taken up preventive measures to minimize the emission of carbon dioxide on the campus. The College has made arrangements for the parking of the vehicles of the students and staff near the entrance. Smoking is prohibited and a usage of plastic is totally banned in the campus. Students are motivated to use bicycles. The institute conducts Green Audit, Energy Audit and Environmental Audit through the agencies that have ISO certification during the year 2021. Our institute celebrated more than 50 National and International commemorative days. Our College follows best practices such as 'Felicitation to Meritorious Students', 'Constellation of Rank Holders'. 'Organizing Inter-Collegiate Student Seminars', 'Book Talk program', and 'Donate a Book on your Birthday'. Institutional Distinctiveness 'Endowment Prizes' and 'Organizing State Level Student Seminar'.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The effective implementation of the curriculum, as prescribed and made mandatory by the affiliating University, is ensured through the development and meticulous deployment of the action plans. At the beginning of the academic year, academic time-tables of all the semesters are prepared. Thereafter, in consonance of the institutional academic time-table, each department prepares its own time-table. The workload, subjects, papers and units to be taught during the entire semester are distributed by the heads of respective department in close consultation of the Principal. Each member of the faculty prepares individual time-table in accordance with departmental time-table and gets approved of the Head.

While preparing lesson plans the faculty members keep in mind the number of hours of teaching and practical recommended by the University is considered. Framing curriculum is the privilege of the affiliating University. Yet, by devising syllabi for skill based and value added certificate courses, University syllabi are enriched meaningfully. Certificate courses are conducted by concerned departments after finalization of such syllabi in departmental meetings and approval by the IQAC.

Each teacher prepares teaching plan for each class to be engaged and such plans bank upon the calendar of events of the college prepared by the IQAC which in turn prepares the calendar of events of the concerned year based on the calendar of events of the affiliating University. Everyday transaction of the syllabi is recorded in the diary and other responsibilities fixed by the Commissioner for Collegiate Education which covers 40 hours per week of a teachers work.

Departmental meetings are periodically conducted to ascertain the status of the implementation of the teaching plan of the syllabi, reasons if any for not achieving the same and also the student response to the teaching-learning process. Teachers have been sufficiently motivated to use ICT-LCD projectors, Net connected smart boards, etc., to make the TLE process effective and result oriented. Added to this the mentoring system helps the process of learning to be more efficacious.

If any hitches or lacunae are found in the newly prescribed or existing syllabi concerned teachers, on obtaining feedback from students, are intimated to the Members of Boards of Studies whom they meet at the time of central valuation or when they attend workshops/seminars in the concerned subjects are attended to.

Each and every action plan is religiously executed, implemented and documented to ensure transaction of prescribed curriculum.

- Use of ICT in teaching is given priority by the IQAC which has made a considerable contribution in making teaching-learning a rewarding experience. Teachers maintain the attendance of ICT classes.
- IQAC takes care of the all round development of the students personalities by giving equal opportunity to all in organizing, conducting and taking part in the fests, seminars and competitions.
- IQAC develops the quality benchmarks and parameters for different academic and administrative activities of the College.
- IQAC manages to get feedback responses from students, parents and alumni on the institution, curriculum, College premises, infrastructure and facilities available for students.
- IQAC organizes Inter-collegiate Student Seminars and Conferences on quality-related themes.
- IQAC ensures the documentation of various programmes and activities conducted by the College leading to quality sustenance and enhancement.
- IQAC works towards the development of research culture in the College.
- It also prepares the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) as per guidelines and parameters of NAAC and submits to NAAC every year in time.

Internal Evaluation System:

An Orientation Program is organized by IQAC in the very beginning of the academic year to inform students about the nature of University examination, Internal Assessment Scheme and also the revaluation or re-totaling facility available for students. Evaluation system in the existing semester system has ensured study-favorable atmosphere. 20 Marks in each theory paper as Internal Assessment has ensured academic ambience.

Two tests and one assignment keep the students on their toes. The semester starts with an awareness of serious evaluation system. The first test of 20 marks is conducted during the 8th week of the semester and is reduced to 4 marks. The Second Test conducted for 80 Marks in the 12th week and is reduced to 10 Marks. Assignment carries 3 marks and attendance carries 3 marks. IA Marks are submitted to the University online in the prescribed format. IA Marks sheets, in addition to test Marks sheets are notified on time to help students to be aware of their academic status before appearing for University examination. In addition to these the college has a tradition of conducting skill assessment test. That test helps identify the slow and advanced learners. Special classes, tutorial classes/remedial classes are conducted to evaluate the learning process. The low scorers/failures are identified, interaction with them is arranged and remedial action is initiated in the form of remedial classes, special assignments and special tests to enable them to perform better.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The process of identification of slow learners comprises conducting discussion, internal tests, additional tests, viva-voce etc. The performance or obtained marks are the key indicators to categorize students as slow learners and advanced learners in a class. Under Non-CBCS scheme of syllabus there are at least two compulsory internal assessment tests conducted at the mid and thirty days prior to the semester end examination. The academic performance in the previous academic year is a good indicator to identify the slow and advanced learners. The admission committee maintains separate statements of marks obtained in the previous examination and subjects opted for the course. The heads of the concerned department prepare list of the slow and advanced learners to bridge up the knowledge gap of the enrolled students.

The Institute promotes independent learning atmosphere that contributes to their academic and personal growth. Special classes for slow learners are conducted to teach them in feasible manner with all necessary tools, such as models, pictures, animated videos etc. Upon series of interactions, required suggestions are given at the first stage with all necessary instructions to increase his/her strength to become good learner of both theoretical as well as practical aspects. As per the provision in CBCS guidelines, a slow learner is offered periodic tests to increase confidence level to learn subject and to perform well.

Other measures taken to enhance the performance of slow learners like Remedial Classes- Bridge Course, Group Study System, Provision of simple and standard lecture notes/course materials, Motivational classes are conducted to improve the mental ability of student to analyze problems and to encourage student to attend classes regularly, Revision of important concepts in a viable manner and Extra assignments to strengthen learning abilities.

Activities undertaken for slow learners:

Extra coaching and individual guidance from the subject teacher by solving question papers of previous University Examination from the students.

The performance of students is being communicated to their parents. Lectures of eminent personalities organized to create confidence among the students. The students who scored better marks in their previous examination are enrolled for the batch of advanced learners.

Activities undertaken for advanced learners

Special programs like professional coaching classes, skill development and communication development programs, aptitude and placement, coaching classes for competitive exams, provision to participate in various competitions such as case study analysis, debate, group discussion, problem solving, decision making exercises, quiz programs and other events are organized in and outside the college. More books facility for advanced learners is provided to these students.

Specific Outcome:

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The target group of the slow learners showed improvement in the knowledge of concerned subjects and scored better marks in the university examination while advanced learners showed better performance in the knowledge of concerned subjects and scored better marks in the university examination. They were participated in classroom interactions and discussions actively.

The college encourages teachers to use the latest teaching technology including audio-visual Teaching machines. Student learning is enhanced by adopting approaches / methods such as seminars, and special

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lectures. Challenging assignments and projects are given to the students to hone-up their intellectual caliber, sharpen their inquisitiveness, induce them to experience the thrill of learning and enjoy the pleasure of achievement. Study material and periodic assignments are also made available to the students. This practice has led to better interaction in the classrooms and laboratories. Invited talks by experts from the industry and academia; and add on courses are organized by the departments, to cover contents beyond the syllabus and recent trends. MOUs are signed with leading industries to bridge the gaps in the curriculum.

Interactive Learning Environment: It consists of the interaction between students and interactive e-learning platforms. Case study imparts skills and enhances students' interaction and involvement in learning process. Another mode of providing learning experience to students is arranging guest lectures, invited talks and student's seminars by the Department/Cells

Experiential learning: This includes both individual and group experiential learning. Under group experiential learning system, a group of students are allotted to a faculty member who helps and guides them academically.

Participatory learning: The students are engaged in activity learning viz., tours and excursions, group discussions, case studies, community surveys, describing visual images.

Problem solving: Few departments have case study analyses/problem solving questions to be answered by the students. Students are taught to solve a problem/case study in each of the courses in the PG programs.

Interdepartmental collaborative activities promote sharing of thoughts/knowledge among the students, to develop leadership qualities in students and inculcate the spirit of team work among the students

Projects: To inculcate and enhance the practical knowledge with innovation, selected students are encouraged to take up minor project. However, as a part of curriculum all PG students have to undertake project work in their final semester.

Collaborative Learning: The Institute also promotes industry sponsored projects and research projects. In activity based learning students are encouraged to participate in project competitions. Arranging industrial visits and field visits for special surveys.

Independent Learning: e-learning platforms are provided to facilitate independent learning where in students can access course contents online. Thus e-learning platforms bridge the gap from classroom learning, and also supplement advanced learning. Wi-Fi facility is available on campus to allow students to access technical resources such as Lectures, video clips; etc. ICT based learning is promoted through web-assignment, web-quiz. Analytical and presentation skills are shaped through case studies. Interest in research is inculcated through paper presentation and publication.

The institute always strives to make the latest Information and Communication Technology (ICT) infrastructure available for use by its students, faculty, and technical staff members in the campus. The learning experiences of the students are enriched with the latest state-of-the-art educational technologies used by the teachers and by adequate use of the ICT enabled tools to its optimum level for making the teaching-learning process is effective.

The institute has dedicated digital classrooms for all programs. The use of multimedia teaching aids like LCD projectors, Hi-Class English Language software, classrooms with internet connectivity computer/laptop systems are usually in use in digital classrooms. The institute has multiple use seminar hall equipped with multimedia facility using ICT tools. Invited talks and webinars are conducted regularly in seminar halls using ICT facilities. The institute encourages the teachers to use modern teaching aids. The program-wise class routine includes the details of the regular classes to be conducted through ICT enabled tools. Faculty members prepare Power Point Presentations (PPTs) and other materials like relevant videos and animations, etc. to deliver the lectures to create the best learning environment for the students. Group assignments are given with eliciting questions for which the learners have to be actively engaged in the library.

Online resources are available. The Audio-Visual Aids are utilized effectively by the faculty members to demonstrate the concepts to the students to enhance the learning experience. Besides printed books and journals, the library subscribes to different e-books and e-journals in the field of Arts, Science, and Commerce with facilities for accessing online and offline databases. During pandemic period Covid-19 Google Platform, Zoom App and Teach mint Apps are extensively used by the faculty members for online classes and webinars for sharing recorded lectures. Frequently regular class evaluations are done using this platform to check the learning level of the students. The institute uses the integrated academic management system of the university to manage the entire academic process. In addition to this, the institute has implemented an ICT enabled teaching. These innovative teaching techniques help the learning experience of students effective, enjoyable, attentive, interactive and communicative. All staff is familiar with all the ICT tools. PPT bank of each teacher is put up on the college website.

The language departments regularly use film screening of the adapted novels, drama or short story. Language lab is very useful and supportive to our students for enhancing their communication skills and language proficiency.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

Our College has adopted the Mechanism for internal assessment in which exam department prepares the time table well in advance and communicated to the students and staff, same is placed on the notice board. After conducting the unit tests as per the University guidelines papers are assessed and brought into notice of the students. The concerned teachers handover the evaluated scripts to the students and confirms the marks allotted to each questions and explain the method of writing the answers. Further. Students are given two to three home assignments in each semester to develop their writing skill; these are also handed over to them by assigning the grades which is one of the bases for the 3 internal marks. Teachers consolidate the marks and show to the students and before freezing the same in the Oasis portal of the Rani Channamma University, the consolidated statement is displayed on the notice board one week before freezing and finally these are recorded in the internal assessment register and authenticated by the Principal and exam department in-charge teachers. This process is carried out in very transparent and robust manner.

The evaluation reforms of University are adopted in our institution is communicated to the students in the induction programme and regular classes. Following is the pattern for reward and record of the Internal assessment Marks:

• Each paper of 100 marks carries 20 IA marks.

- Out of the 20 IA marks, 04+10 marks are for two written tests, of remaining 06 IA marks, 03 marks for assignments, seminars, sports, cultural activities, NSS and conduct, and 03 marks for attendance.
- In each paper 2 Unit Tests shall be conducted for the award of IA marks. First Unit Test shall be conducted in the 8th week for 20 marks later reduced to 04 marks. Second Unit Test shall be conducted for 80 marks, on the University semester-end Exam model in the 12th week later reduced to 10 marks.
- The Exam Committee shall preserve the IA records of all the students till the declaration of the semester examination results. And it also preserves the answer scripts.
- A list of consolidated IA marks in all the papers of a particular semester duly signed by the HOD/Staff in charge and Principal shall be submitted to the University Examination section by the College prior to the date of commencement of the semester examination.
- The exam department maintains a Master Register of consolidated IA marks of all the students.
- This Master Register is kept open for inspection by the University authorities at any time.
- Display of IA marks on the notice board.
- There is no provision for the improvement of IA marks.
- Online submission of IA marks to the University through the University software 'OASIS'.
- We have been awarding 03 marks for the students whose attendance is more than 90%, 2 for more than 80% and 01 mark for above 75%.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, timebound and efficient

Response:

IQAC consistently work on the student centric activities. It interacts with exam committee and the students. The Academic Calendar is displayed on the college notice board and on college website for all stakeholders. The college conducts tutorial, home assignment, tests, presentations, group discussion, etc. to assess the performance of students. The college exam committee executes its internal exams in a very meticulous manner. Internal assessment marks related grievances if any are placed before the concern teacher at initial level and redressed on time bound manner, Internal exam marks of the student are displayed on the notice board and queries are discussed with them till they satisfy, if any serious grievances are placed before the committee where Principal is the chairperson. Since it is an internal evaluation, students cooperate in a very positive manner and up to this stage; no such serious grievance is raised in the college.

However, internal supervisors and internal flying squad are deputed for smooth conduct of the external exams. Generally there is a zero tolerance policy for the malpractices conducted by the students.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Programme and course outcomes for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website and communicated to teachers and students.

Response:

The College follows the programme wise curriculum designed by the university. The learning outcomes of the programmes and courses are stated clearly by the university. The same is published in the official website of the university which can be downloaded by the affiliated colleges. The college has developed its POs and COs taking into consideration the mission and goals of the programmes. For all the undergraduate and postgraduate programmes the POs and COs are drafted following discussions with all the stakeholders.

The programmes offered by College cater to multiple interests of the student community and also at building the human capital needed by the society and nation. The programme outcomes and course outcomes primarily aim at imparting knowledge and skills which is critical for building students' competence and personality. There is also an emphasis on holistic development of the students as the learning outcomes focus on imparting values and ethics and enhancing their interpersonal and communication skills to make them employable in the world. The POs/COs is thus in keeping with the prime motto of the college i.e. empowering students and preparing them to be catalysts of change.

All the departments make brainstorming sessions to draw up the programme outcomes. Departments prepare a course file with details of the course objectives, course outcomes, modules, assessment and teaching tools, reference material, total number of teaching hours and credits at the beginning of the academic year. COs of the different courses are first presented in the meeting with Principal. Once

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approval has been given the course file is displayed on the department notice boards and communicated to students.

The syllabi of all the departments (UG and PG programmes) with the programme outcomes and the course outcomes of all the individual courses offered by the departments are displayed on the College website. The Exam Section presents a PO and CO attainment report to the Principal at the end of the semester examination.

Communication of the POs & COs

All departments are expected to conduct internal brainstorming sessions to finalize the programme outcomes and course outcomes. The course outcomes finalized by the departments are then presented to the chairman of IQAC for approval. The POs and COs are discussed, reviewed and approved by the IQAC. The POs and COs are presented at the department meeting. The POs and COs are incorporated in the syllabus are displayed on the website and notice board. At the end of the semester the PO and CO attainment are reviewed by each of the Departments.

The College website has details of the POs of all the UG and PG programmes The COs of all the courses offered by a department are displayed on the department page on the main website. At the beginning of the academic year during the Orientation Programme students and parents are briefed about the POs. The concerned faculty of each of the department brief their respective classes about the POs and COs.

2.6.2 Attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

Response:

Our college has been continuously working on the attainment of the outcomes very systematically from the first year itself. The very purpose of academic journey is elaborated during inauguration of academic activities, induction program, expert lectures and classroom interactions. Online and on paper feedback of alumni helps to evaluate whether students have properly perceived the content of the curriculum.

Cos and POs are displayed at various locations in the college. Close awareness of cross-cutting issues, basic conceptual clarity, life-skills, practical exposure and their behavioral change are few of the parameters to recognize or evaluate the attainment of their course outcomes. Peer Evaluation, Home Assignments, Unit Tests and university assessment are substantially helping to evaluate the learning outcomes.

The college provides subject related add-on-value added courses to attain the actual outcomes at the end of the course and extend it through their life. Lectures on competitive examinations, career counseling and soft skills are playing crucial role in the overall development of the student's personality. To evaluate the outcomes of the above programs, each and every activity is pre-planned.

POs and COs are measured through both academic and non-academic performances of the students. The performance of the students in the internal and external examinations, in the practical and assignments and participation in class activities are some of the means by which program specific outcomes are measured. Their performance within and outside the college in the various academic events provides another index of their learning-levels.

The PO and CO attainment is evaluated by:

Direct Method:

- The Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and End-Semester Examination (ESE) are the prime tools for evaluation of PO and CO attainment. The CIA matrix comprises of two tests, assignment, presentation, practicals and attendance. The marks obtained by the students are mapped to CO and PO
- Experiential learning in the form of organizing events like workshops/seminars/fests is also used to evaluate students' organizational and leadership skills which are a component of PO attainment.
- The PO attainment of the postgraduate students is also evaluated on the basis of their research output in the form of paper presentation, project work and publications.
- Community Development Program is a mandatory component of the PG and some UG programs. The involvement of the students and their impact on community also helps to map PO attainment.

Indirect Method:

- Student Feedback on Curriculum is obtained and the same is shared with the departments so that their feedback is discussed and relevant changes, if any, are communicated to the BoS of the University.
- The results of the CIA and ESE are placed for approval by the Principal with a brief on PO and CO attainment. Then it is placed before the local governing body for approval.

PO is evaluated based on the performance of the students in terms of their progression to higher studies, self-employment, qualification in competitive examinations and placement.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

Response:

The institute promotes regular engagement of faculty, students and staff with neighbourhood community for their holistic and sustainable community development through various activities. 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the village.

The College is actively involved in extension activities. A model initiative in this connection is the response to the disaster of floods in Kodagu 2018 and Davaleshwar 2019. The NSS wing of our college collected and distribution of funds for Kodagu flood victims of rupees 1,48,193. Flood Relief activities in the nearby village Davaleshwar. Distribution of more than 50,000 rupees food packets, clothing's and Medicines which were collected from our students, alumni and our college. Our NSS volunteers actively participated in the rallies on HIV/AIDS awareness program organized by College; and also conduct expert talks on HIV related issues to the students.

Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

The policy of the college is to periodically enhance the existing infrastructure in accordance with the needs and add new amenities to its existing infrastructure by procuring the necessary equipments for all the labs to facilitate effective teaching and learning. Our institution has developed the infrastructure and physical facilities sufficient enough as per the minimum specified requirements to ensure the effective teaching and learning. The college accommodates students studying in UG and PG programs. The campus is spread over 4 Acres and 24 Guntas which enable excellent infrastructure for Academic process, career progression and higher education. The campu's main building accommodates the chamber of Principal, administrative office, auditorium, classrooms, Staff room, staff cabins, well furnished library, digital library, washrooms, laboratories, NSS office, multi-purpose Gymnasium, IQAC room and open theater with 250 seating capacity. Our college has 13 LCD projectors, 13 screens, 123 computers which include 7 laptops and Wi-Fi enabled campus and internet band width is 60 MBPS Airtel line.

Class Rooms: The College has sufficient number of well-ventilated spacious class rooms for conducting theory classes. There are 10 glass boards and 07 white boards in the college. The class rooms are used for remedial and enrichment programmes also before and after the regular teaching hours. The class rooms are equipped to meet the conventional teaching methods and furnished comfortably to meet the requirements. There are 3 smart classrooms for effective teaching and learning.

Laboratories: All the labs are equipped with modern, modular and functional workspaces integrating the students' needs of water, electricity, gas and ICT facilities. The laboratories are designed with the safety features imbibed in the infrastructure and create an excellent ambience and atmosphere for work. These are well maintained both for carrying out curriculum practical sessions and experiments beyond curriculum. These laboratories are sophisticated with instrumentation and computational facilities. The college has an exclusive English language lab with 21 computers connected with LAN and 'Hi-class' software where the students practice and test their communication skills and improve their Learning, Speaking, Reading and Writing skills. The Business lab provides enough opportunity to the students for practicing with different proformae and models. The Agricultural Marketing department has instruments and equipments which help to measure the moisture content and give an opportunity to absorb the practical knowledge for grading and pricing of the agricultural commodities. The computer lab with 46 computers with LAN and internet connectivity helps the students for carrying the practical computer applications.

Auditorium: The College has an auditorium with modern public address systems for organizing special lecturers, workshops, seminars and conferences and other programs with seating capacity of 200.

Girls' hostels: Our institution has girls' hostels which are constructed with the financial assistance from University Grants Commission and additional amount is contributed by the management of KLE Society, Belagavi.

4.1.2 The Institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoor, outdoor), gymnasium, yoga centre etc.

Response:

Sports and games: Various sports facilities are made available to the students, within the campus, focusing sports as one of the significant extracurricular activities. The college is committed to create a balanced academic, cultural and sports activities atmosphere for the development of students' overall personality. Various sports competitions such as inter-collegiate, zonal level, inter -zonal and state level help in developing team spirit among students. Their interpersonal relationship is enabled in a very healthy manner. Students are awarded medals, trophies and certificates to motivate them. Our college has the best practice of providing colors, sports uniforms, diet money and trainers and also instituted endowment prizes of Rs. 5,000 to the sportsmen placed in inter-university participants, Rs. 2,000 to each University Blue, Rs. 1,000 to each member of University champion team. Further, some patrons have also instituted cash prizes of Rs. 1,000 each for five sports persons who are placed in inter-collegiate individual cycling, Rs. 1,000 for two sportspersons for placing in wrestling and Rs. 2,000 for the sportspersons placed in inter-collegiate Athletic competition. Achievers' photos are displayed in the Prospectus of the college and hoardings. Sports students are provided with TA, Registration fees, Trainers facility and diet. The honorarium to the Trainer is also provided.

Outdoor Games: The College caters the needs of all major outdoor sports events with standard courts and track facilities. The playground facilitates the following:

- * Tenni-coit courts measuring 29X14 mtrs
- * 200 mtrs track with 6 lanes

In addition to these the students are encouraged to take up field events like Javelin-throw, Shot-put, Hammer-throw, and Discus-throw by providing them with necessary sports equipments and training.

Indoor Games: A fully furnished indoor games hall is put in place to play Table-Tennis, Chess and Carom, etc., are provided to the students and staff.

Gymnasium: A well furnished gymnasium is available in the college with 02 Spin bike, Iron rod, 10 sets steel dumb bells, 4 Iron dumb bells Rubber plates, Trade-mill, Weight lifting set, T-bar, 5 Big size iron plates facilities.

Cultural Activities: The College also encourages students to participate in various cultural and literary activities and make the students excel in their field of interest and they are provided with TA, Registration

fees, Costumes, Trainer facility, diet and all other equipments which are essential to the cultural department for successful functioning. The college conducts various cultural activities like annual day, Arts fest, Science fest, Commerce fest and talents day to hone in their talents. It also develops aesthetic ability and an appreciation for the art. The student who wins the first place in the Uni-fest will be awarded with cash prize of Rs. 1,000 and felicitated on the special occasion. 4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS)

Response:

The library recognizes the importance of functioning in a thoroughly professional way taking into consideration the interests of all the departments. The Library committee consists of the principal as Chairperson aided by a Convener, senior faculty and Librarian as secretary of the committee and a student representative. The Committee also has representatives from each department. The Library Committee works on a rational basis of faculty involvement. These faculty representatives report back to their respective departments on all the issues discussed, funds allocated, new journals subscribed to and they also encourage members to suggest names of books to be included. The faculty members of the committee also play an important role in coordinating the library Orientation for the entrants. This enables the Librarianand the library staff to meet student batches and introduce them to the easy means of accessing the books on the shelves as well as available on-line resources. The library committee takes the lead incepting strategic directions for all aspects of the library services and operations. It meets regularly to engage with all the issues related to student requirements from the library as resource and endeavors to priorities funds judisiciously, in order to make the process and operation of the library students friendly. The Library committee pays attention to the needs and intellectual aspirations of the students who are enabled by this valuable resource towards maintaining world class academic standards. Librarian has instituted cash prizes of Rs. 2,000 for two best library users which created the positive impact on the students.

The library is housed in the main building of the college with 100 seating capacity for reading and conference purpose. A separate reading room for staff is available for their reading, preparation and research. Library is fully automated with all its subsystems like LAN connectivity and Wi-Fi facility is also available. Library Management Software system is incorporated with latest technologies that enables library to serve its uses more timely, efficiently and effectively. The library has a wide collection of Books, Journals, Audio- video materials, Photocopying facilities, News papers, E-resources, previous year question papers etc. A specialized service provided by the library included INFLIBNET, Resource Managing Software and e-lib. Barcode online circulation System is in practice in the library. the library is a member of INFLIBNET – N-list project and provides web access to Books, Periodicals, Theses, Dissertations, etc. the digitalization of the library through OPAC has resulted in the easy access of information from any computer within the campus on subjects/ Author – wise book, account information like books borrowed and due date to return, penalty to be paid, if not returned in time and so on. It also facilitates retrieval of information.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi

Response:

The institution emphasizes on Information Technology infrastructure to boost IT skills among the students. The institutution is equipped with 123 computers including 7 Laptops. The Computer lab and a Digital Library have internet connectivity with 60 MBPS speed, and Stand alone systems are connected with LAN. The computer laboratory is interconnected with 60 MBPS speed. The D-Link switch has been upgraded and installed on 17/12/2020. 07 laptops are distributed among various departments to conduct the classes using ICT. Laptops are used for preparing research papers, internal assessment sheets, NAAC related files etc. These are annually updated with antivirus and are formatted as and when required In all 10 printers out of which 2 are color printers, are available and efficiently utilized at the institutution to print the hard copies of documents. The campus is under CCTV surveillance. Earlier there were 20 CCTV cameras which are updated to 59 CCTV cameras this year. There are two sets of DVR.

13 class rooms, laboratories and conference hall are ICT enabled. 2 new projectors have been purchased on 27/09/2021.

The conference hall has a high quality audio system. 2 electronic podiums with in-built speakers, microphones and LED lights are available.

The outdated components are replaced and are updated time to time. Significant quantity of study material in the form of PDFs, e-books, videos, audios, presentations, word files, etc., is available at e-library and provided to the students at any time they need them.

Our college has installed LCDs, Motorola screens and smart boards to enable teachers and students to switch over to dust free and IT supported teaching-learning methods. These IT supported facilities are updated as and when required. The computers in the computer laboratory, digital library, administrative office and language laboratory etc. are connected with LAN and internet facility. Earlier our institution had internet services from BSNL up to 5th October, 2020, and now service of internet is taken on lease basis from Airtel on 6th October, 2020 for the period of 5 years with 60 MBPS speed. In order to provide Wi-Fi facility 05 routers have been installed by the lessor at free of cost.

The college office uses LAN facility and softwares for admission of students and fee collection. This software is provided by Theorem technology, Bengaluru. The examination section uses OASIS software provided by the Rani Channamma University, Belagavi to update students results and to maintain all other confidential matters. These IT facilities are updated annually. The accounts section uses Tally ERP 9.0 version. 'People works' software for salary of unaided staff is provided by our Society and on-time attendance management system for Biometrics of staff is used.

The library uses e-lib and INFBLIBNET software for its automation.

The computer laboratory uses OS to run C & C++ programming, Tally ERP 9.0 version for computerized accounting, MS ACCESS to run data base, VB net, MS Excel for spread sheet application. Language Lab Uses Hi-Class software for enhancement of Learning, Speaking, Reading and Writing skills. The college is

4.4.2 There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

Response:

In order to fulfill the vision, mission and objectives of the institution and to impart high quality education, the college authority has created sufficient infrastructure necessary to facilitate effective and efficient teaching and learning processes. The policy of the college is to enhance the existing infrastructure and add new amenities to its existing infrastructure by procuring the necessary equipments for all the labs and academic facilities.

Our institution is very much committed to develop quality and state of art infrastructure to make available for effective teaching-learning process. Our society develops the infrastructure as and when the new programmes are introduced. The college prepares and sends the proposals to the 'Funding Agencies' to get the funds and after receiving the funds the infrastructure development committee gives the approval for the utilization. Afterwards we invite tenders or quotations and the lowest bidder will be accepted after taking the undertakings from the vendors for completion of work according to the standard fixed by the society. In every stage of the work, quality is strictly ensured. The infrastructure development committee is also accountable for taking care of utilization, up-keeping and maintenance of the infrastructure. The Financial Administrator and superintendent monitor the quality of maintenance of infrastructure and equipments. The custodians of the equipments frequently examine them for timely maintenance and repairs to ensure peak performance and accuracy. The procedures are as follow for the infrastructure:

- 1. Prepare the proposals for seeking funds from the agencies.
- 2. Placing the proposal before the committee for approval.
- 3. Getting the approval from the Head office of our society.
- 4. Submitting proposals through proper authority.
- 5. Getting sanction of the funds from the agencies.
- 6. Inviting the tenders or quotations.
- 7. Preparing the comparative statement.
- 8. Issuing the work order after receiving the security deposits and getting under-takings.

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- 9. Supervising the work.
- 10. Ensuring optimum and effective utilization of the developed infrastructure.

Laboratory: Lab equipments are thoroughly inspected by lab assistants before the commencement of practical classes and examinations. User's registers and logbooks are maintained and the instruments are used under close supervision of teachers. Maintenance expenses are met by the management. Transparency is observed in purchase of equipments and chemicals by inviting the quotations from venders and lowest but quality suppliers are given the supply orders.

Electrically sensitive equipments are provided with necessary back up to ensure steady functioning and to safeguard against voltage fluctuations. In case of disruption in power supply, the diesel generator having a capacity of 7.5KVA functions as the substitute source. The power requirement for lighting during night is met with through solar panels.

Class Rooms: The class rooms are well maintained. Most of the classrooms are maintained neat and tidy by the support staff and used for teaching and learning effectively. The class rooms are used for remedial and enrichment programs also before and after the regular teaching hours.

Computers: The College has a system where the lab instructor and the lab assistants to oversee the maintenance of the systems. The use of the computer lab is scheduled as per time table. Any repairs beyond the scope of the administrator are carried out by external agencies.

Sports amenities: All the amenities are under the charge of the Director of Physical Education. A sports room houses sports utilities. Time is allotted to students for using Gymnasium. The maintenance of the courts is done regularly. Common facilities like Ground and indoor facilities are provided to the sister institutions on prior request.

Library: library facilities are open to the students and staff from 8.00am to 5.30 pm to working days and Maintenance and utilization of library resources are ensured by strictly following the library rules. The maximum period of borrowing for books is fourteen days. The students can access the reference books in reference section. The library facility is extended to our Alumni; where the Alumni are allowed to borrow the books and journals from the library for their higher education and preparation for the competitive examinations. The library committee with the recommendations of the staff as recommended by the parent University, procures the books, journals and magazines as and when the syllabus is changed. The library is fully automated with different soft-ware to keep pace with the current needs.

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External and Internal Academic Audit

In TLP – the students, for them various methodologies used for the development of learner through student support activities. Different processes involved for sensitization of students are social issues through different committees-women empowerment, sexual harassment, placement activities, etc. The course outcomes, program outcomes, program specific outcomes are frequently reviewed. Every year our college conducts several Conferences, Seminars, Workshop, FDP, etc.

Diversity of the students in terms of their educational background and experiences makes it necessary to implement innovative teaching strategies to enhance student-centric learning. Different Departments use varied interactive lecture methodologies to facilitate quality learning. Most of the departments are equipped with modern teaching aids like Computers, LCD, slide-projectors, charts, models, maps. Solid waste management

Solid waste includes biodegradable and non-biodegradable components. Every day all the academic buildings and other area in the campus are cleaned by our menial staff and they separate out waste and dispose accordingly. The solid waste is regularly collected by the town municipal council and they transport it.

Bio-waste management

With smart initiatives like Go Green Campus Model, waste management is helping our college to achieve a higher level of environmental performance. Dustbins are provided to maintain clean, neat and tidy in the campus. Dustbins are kept in every room to collect the waste twice in a day. Further, Dustbins are kept at various locations of the campus. Adequate sweepers and scavengers appointed to maintain clean campus. Students and staff members are encouraged to participate in "SWACHA BHARTH" programme to keep the campus neat and clean. The faculties and students are regularly advised to control waste at lower extent. Biodegradable materials such as Food waste from college are converted into manure in compost pits which are used as organic manures for the garden. Non- biodegradable materials such as paper and plastic waste are segregated and resold by the college. Vermi compost unit has been established within the campus. The waste management like vermi composting of garden or organic manure is used for college garden vermi composting has gained popularity in the domestic settings as it provides a way to treat organic waste more quickly in manure composting, it also generates products that have lower salinity level. It is a nutrient rich organic manure and soil conditioned in the form i.e. relatively easy for plants to absorb. The waste materials that are collected in the campus dumped into the vermi compost unit to convert it into manure.

• Liquid waste management

The drinking water in the campus is being analyzed by the college in every week. Liquid Waste from the points of generation is let out as effluent into a proper drainage facility and to avoid stagnation. Regular maintenance of drinking water tap, RO water filter, and drainage and water pipelines is kept by the college support staff.

• E- waste management

The non-working computer spare parts and other non-working equipment are safely disposed to Electrical shops for recycling. The cartridge of laser printers is refilled outside the college campus. UPS Batteries are recharged/repaired/exchanged by the suppliers. Waste compact discs are used by students in tinkering Lab. These wastes are stored and sold to the vendors after receiving order from KLE Society.

3. The Context

In this knowledge era, the rural students lag behind in competing with the students of advanced colleges and in the global market of employment. They feel denied of better learning conditions in the rural areas. They usually hails from rural background. They are weak in communication skills. They hesitate to come forward with their meek abilities. They hope eagerly to learn more and stand beside the successful fellow learners. They found one of their senior from this college stood third to the university. Hence, they too wish for the opportunity to get through with better results. They wanted to meet all the RANK HOLDERS from different streams and wished to interact with them to be equipped with tact and techniques of facing the exams in a better way. So, the college, with the consent of the student parliament, started this practice in anticipation of better results in forth coming days.

4. The Practice

Since the inception of the college, for the first time, our college got the 7th Rank in BA in the year 2006 for the Karnatak University, Dharwad. The name of the student is Miss A. S. Karigar. She scored 1265 out of 1500 (84.33%). It was a boosting thing for all the teachers and students then. It was the 'Dreams Come True' time. It was the result of twenty years dedicated service of the faculty. Since then, the faculty was consistently guiding the students in that direction. After a long period of seven years, in 2013, again our student Mr. Ramesh Harakangi got the 3rd rank in BA with Gold Medal in Kannada core subject. He scored 94.18%. It was the incremental growth and is the result of advanced facilities in all the spheres of the college. This created awareness among the students. He ignited the fellow students of the college.

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The event made the faculty as well as students to think of inviting all the RANK HOLDERS of the Rani Channamma University, to inspire the young talents of our college to achieve excellence in their studies by providing a platform to interact with the students. The RANK HOLDERS attending constellation program provided TA, DA and honorarium by the college. At the same time, the college felicitated those RANK HOLDERS for their excellent performance. The college arranges interaction session for the benefit of our students. This definitely will bring a radical change in the teaching and learning process in the forth coming days. The result of this is seen in the day to-day student behavioural patterns. This practice will help the students in future also. It also provided us to get the feedback from the RANK HOLDERS.

5. Evidence of success

The present students are convinced that there is no substitute for the smart work. This programme brought about attitudinal changes in the students' way of thinking. Then onwards, it is observed that the reading habits of the students enhanced to a greater extent and the librarian is of the opinion that students are asking for various reference books. Questioning pattern at classroom has been found distinct from previous experiences. The behavioral patterns of the students changed at once and most of the students are now result oriented. The immediate impact of the programme has been recorded from the results of the next semester exams. Miss Deepa Saptasagar got 6th Rank in B.Com with Gold Medal in Business Statistics during the year 2016. In the same year Miss Komal Dhoomagond secured Gold Medals in Income Tax and Cost Accounting. Two of our gem students Miss Gayatri Bagewadi secured 6th Rank with Gold Medal in English and Miss Roopa Sutar 10th Rank during 2019 in BA from Rani Channamma University, Belagavi in this cycle. The students' performance in examinations has consistently improved from year to year. There are 73 Centum scorers of which 67 in Commerce and 06 in Science stream in different subjects during this period. There are 313 students scored 95 and above marks in various subjects during this assessment period.

The practice has ignited the innate urge of the students. The college administration has decided to continue the practice which will definitely give an opportunity to secure more ranks in the forth coming days.
